

### **Maximos the Confessor – January 21**



On January 21, in the Holy Orthodox Church, we commemorate our righteous Father Maximos the Confessor.

#### Verses

Being severely tortured and disfigured, you were made whole; And into God's hands, O Maximos, you present your soul. On the twenty-first, the voice of Maximos was made silent on earth.

Maximos was born in Constantinople. First, he was a highranking official for Emperor Heraclius and, after that, a monk and abbot of a monastery close to Constantinople. He was the greatest

defender of Orthodoxy against the so-called Monothelite heresy which proceeded from the heresy of Eutyches. This heretic claimed that there is only one nature in Christ (Monophysitism), so the Monothelites claimed that there is only one will in Christ (Monothelitism). Maximos openly opposed this heresy and found himself as an opponent of the emperor and the patriarch. Maximos did not frighten easily but endured to the end in preaching that there were two wills as well as two natures in Christ. Because of these efforts, a council was held in Carthage and another in Rome. Both councils anathematized the teachings of the Monothelites. Maximos suffered greatly for Orthodoxy: he was tortured by princes, deceived by church officials and bishops, spat upon by the masses of the people, beaten by soldiers, exiled, imprisoned, until finally, with a severed tongue and hand, he was condemned to exile for the rest of his life where he spent three years in prison and gave up his soul to God in the mid-seventh century.

On this day, we also commemorate the Martyr Neophytos of Nicaea; Venerable Zosimas, Bishop of Syracuse in Sicily; and Venerable Maximos the Greek of Russia.

By their intercessions, O Christ God, have mercy upon us. Amen.
