





Reader: The reading is from the Epistle of the holy Apostle Paul to the Romans.

Therefore whoever resists the authority resists the ordinance of God, and those who resist will bring judgment on themselves.

Te Deum (or The Great Doxology see end)

The Te Deum is an early Christian hymn of praise. It is traditionally ascribed to Saints Ambrose and Augustine, on the occasion of the latter's baptism by the former in AD 387. (Sing to melody of Akathist to the Mother of God)

We praise You, O God, we acknowledge You to <u>be</u> the Lord. All the earth worships You, the Father ever<u>lasting</u>. To You all the angels, the heavens and the <u>pow-ers</u> cry aloud. To You cherubim and seraphim continually cry:

"Holy, holy, holy, Lord God of Hosts; heaven and earth are full of the majesty of Your glory."

The glorious company of the apostles, the goodly fellowship of the prophets, the noble army of martyrs, together all praise You.

The holy Church throughout the world acknowledges You: the Father of infinite majesty;
Your honorable, true, and only Son;
and the Holy Spirit, the Comforter.

You are the King of Glory, O Christ. You are the everlasting Son of the Father. When You took upon Yourself to deliver man, You humbled Yourself to be born of a virgin.

When You overcame the <u>sting</u> of death, You opened the kingdom of heaven to all be<u>lie</u>vers. You sat down at the <u>right</u> hand of God in the <u>glo-ry</u> of the Father. We believe that You shall <u>come to</u> be our Judge.

We therefore pray, help Your <u>ser</u>vants,
