



Biography: Fr. John Jillions helped found The Institute for Orthodox Christian Studies (IOCS) in Cambridge, England. He has degrees from McGill University, St. Vladimir's Seminary, and Aristotle University of Thessaloniki. He has taught at St. Paul University, the University of Ottawa in Canada, St. Vladimir's Seminary and is currently an adjunct instructor at Fordham University in New York. He has been an Orthodox priest for forty years, serving parishes in Australia, Greece, England, Canada, and the US. He is married to Denise, and they have three sons, two daughters-in-law, and two grandchildren. They live in Hartford, Connecticut.

Course Description: The first three sessions will look at how faith and doubt shaped American life from the 1600's to the present. We will highlight key figures in this history who are examples of integrity, seeking God's direction, perseverance, service, and pursuit of truth and the common good. This connects to current events and how we might make sense of our national life in this election year. The final lecture will look at the Orthodox experience of tradition and change in a time of rapid social change. Throughout history, the people of God have reacted in various ways to external events. What can we learn from this? What elements are essential for Church life and what could and should be changed?

Biography: Paul Ladouceur teaches at the Orthodox School of Theology at Trinity College and at the Montreal Institute of Orthodox Theology. His most recent books are Modern Orthodox Theology (2019), and, with Brandon Gallaher as co-editor, The Patristic Witness of Georges Florovsky: Essential Theological Writings (2019). His major current research interests are modern Orthodox theology and spirituality, Sergius Bulgakov, the theology of religious diversity, and the theology of human rights. Dr. Ladouceur participates in the Canadian Council of Churches and is Orthodox Co-Chair of the Orthodox-Pentecostal Academic Dialogue.

Course Description: Orthodox spirituality has two principal thrusts, the communal and the personal. The communal is our participation in the prayer and worship of the Orthodox Church. The personal is the application of our commitment to the Orthodox tradition, to the "life in Christ" by each member of the Church, ordained or not ordained, living in the dedication of a monastic life, or witnessing to Christ in the society in which we live — "in the world." The underlying basis of Orthodox spirituality is the same for all, aimed at theosis, union with God in Christ through the Holy Spirit, but its application varies according to our calling and situation in life.



**Mission Statement**: The Eagle River Institute is hosted annually by the members of Saint John Cathedral to provide a forum for Orthodox scholars to address lay people on topics relevant to everyday, Christian life. The Institute also contributes to the greater, educational needs of

the Church by publishing its lectures and other materials in its Media Library.

#### THE SYNAXARION

## John of the Ladder – 4<sup>th</sup> Lent

On April 14, in the Holy Orthodox Church, we commemorate the Apostles Aristarchos, Pudens and Trophymos of the Seventy; Martyr Thomais of Alexandria; and New-martyr Demetrios of the Peloponnesos.



On this, the Fourth Sunday of Great Lent, we make remembrance of our godly father, John Climacus, the author of *The Ladder of Divine Ascent*.

#### Verses

John, dead in the flesh and also living, lives eternally, even though appearing dead and without breath.

Leaving his words as a ladder for the journey upwards, he shows his pursuit of the journey upwards.

The Church also commemorates him on March 30 when he reposed. The celebration of his feast on this day probably arose from the custom prevalent in the honorable monasteries of starting the Great Lent with the reading of his book of sermons, in which John describes the method of elevating the soul to God, as ascending a ladder. John

of the Ladder came to Mount Sinai as a 16-year-old boy and remained there, first as a novice under obedience, and afterwards as a recluse, and finally as abbot of Sinai until his eightieth year. One time, Moses, a disciple of his, fell asleep under the shade of a very large boulder. John, in prayer in his cell, saw that his disciple was in danger of the boulder toppling over on him and prayed to God for him. Later on, when Moses returned, he fell on his knees and gave thanks to his spiritual father for saving him from certain death. He related how, in a dream, he heard John calling him and he jumped up and, at that moment, the boulder tumbled. Had he not jumped, he would have been crushed. John Climacus died around the year 563 A.D.

Through his intercessions, O Lord Jesus Christ our God, have mercy upon us. Amen.
