



10/28/2025 Parish Council Meeting Summary

- Each PC member shared their 30 second elevator pitch on "Why am I an Orthodox Christian?"
- Ann Patras has agreed to be designated co-chair along with Martha Fisher.
- The PC discussed ideas to welcome newcomers and guests. A sign-up sheet for emails will be posted in the Narthex for those who wish to receive the weekly bulletin. Tim will continue to work on compiling a Welcome Packet for newcomers.
- The PC Bylaws committee will continue their work on writing up a PC bylaws document. The PC discussed what they would like the document to contain and how it should be formatted.
- Sydney provided an update on the cemetery committee. It has been formed and all members have been given necessary documents and files to review prior to their upcoming meeting.
- The PC reviewed a request to host a Ukrainian Music fundraiser event at the church after the New Year. The PC unanimously voted to allow it to be hosted and will offer support where needed.
- The Maranatha House will host six volunteers with Global Empowerment Mission (GEM) who are in Alaska to offer support following Typhoon Halong. They will be "offering immediate emergency supplies and temporary shelter to the hardest hit communities, using planes, boats, and off-road equipment suitable for the area's terrain. Furthermore, GEM is coordinating with local tribal governments, Alaskan state agencies, and federal partners to restore critical infrastructure, such as power, water, and comms." (www.globalempowermentmission.org)
- Tim and Marshall updated the PC on Thrivent and the endowment fund. A proposal was made and the PC unanimously agreed to officially start the endowment fund with \$30,000 from a pool of funds/investment accounts recommended by the financial committee.
- The small cupola has been installed on the chapel. The cap that the large cupola sat on has to be completely redone. The cap will be encased in fiberglass and will cost at least \$6,500 in addition to an installation fee.
- Several parishioners have expressed interest in watching the large cupola get installed. An announcement about the installation will be emailed to the parish once the date and time is known.
- The PC spent an additional 30 minutes discussing what they learned from a strategic planning video Fr. Marc shared prior to the PC meeting. The PC will send out a request for parishioners to submit a request to be on the Parish Strategic Planning Committee.
- Next meeting: November 25th, 7:00p-8:30p in the church basement.

THE SYNAXARION

Olga of Alaska - November 9

On November 9, in the Holy Orthodox Church, we commemorate Blessed Olga of Alaska.



Saint Olga was born on February 3, 1916, in the Yup'ik village of **Kwethluk**, Alaska. Her family herded reindeer, and Olga (**Arrsamquq**, "AKH-some-gook her Yup'ik name which means lowly, hidden or unadorned) loved spending time in the mountains as a child, playing with her six brothers.

She married Nicolai Michael in 1935 and gave birth to her first of 13 children in November of that same year. Three of their children died in infancy, two around the age of three.

Olga served her community as a midwife and a healer. Her daughter Anita described her presence as "low-key" and calm, going about her business without making "a big deal out of it." In

Yup'ik culture, such women were known to have strong faith, and Olga was no exception, practicing traditional medicine in her village coupled with her Orthodox faith.

In 1962 Olga's husband was ordained a priest, and she gained the title of "Matushka" or priest's wife. She began serving their parish in this important motherly role. She is known to have memorized major of the church services, baked the eucharistic Prosphora bread, made vestments, organized events in the life of the parish, and provided hospitality for guests.

She cared for the children of the village, providing clothes and food whenever it was needed, passing on the Orthodox faith to the children of her village, as well as the traditions and stories of their culture.

She reposed peacefully on November 8, 1979, on the feast of the Synaxis of the Angels. That time of year in Kwethluk, travel was often dangerous and many who desired to attend her funeral found they might not be able. But on the day of the funeral, the weather became mild, ice melted, and even the ground softened so her grave could be dug. Fair weather birds even appeared. The following day, winter weather returned.


Many children born afterwards in the village were named Olga in her memory. In Orthodox fashion, her veneration started from the grassroots, spreading from local veneration in Alaska to

the rest of North America and the world. Women who suffered abuse found healing at her gravesite. She has become known as an intercessor for mothers and midwives, and many Orthodox women have an icon of St. Olga present while in labor.

On November 9, 2023, Saint Olga's canonization was authorized by the Holy Synod of the Orthodox Church in America. Her glorification service took place on June 20, 2025, and her feast day was established as November 9.

In some of the icons of Saint Olga she is surrounded with the aurora or "northern lights," as she is sometimes known as "The Northern Light of God's Holy Church."





On November 9, in the Holy Orthodox Church, we commemorate our father among the saints Nektarios, Metropolitan of Pentapolis in Egypt, the wonderworker.

Verses

O Nektarios, since you drink the nectar of life eternal, You gush streams of healings.

On the ninth, the soul of Nektarios was taken from his body.

Nektarios was born in Thrace on October 1, 1846. Because of his brilliance and holiness, Nektarios ascended in the Church of Alexandria from monk to metropolitan of Pentapolis in eastern Libya.

His flock loved him, but his swift ascent aroused the envy of lesser clergy and laity. In 1890, Patriarch Sophronios relieved the innocent Metropolitan Nektarios of his duties and commanded him to leave Egypt. He became a provincial preacher and teacher around Athens. Through his eloquent sermons, his untiring labors to educate fitting men for the priesthood, his generous alms and deeds despite his own poverty, and the meekness and fatherly love that were manifest in him, Nektarios became a spiritual guide to many. In 1904, he began the building of Holy Trinity Convent on the island of Aegina. Nektarios spent the rest of his life there, and through his prayers delivered the island from drought, healed the sick, and cast out demons. The saint's relics continue to work miracles since his entry into eternal life on this day in 1920. He was canonized in 1961. In 1998, Patriarch Petros VII and the Holy Synod of Alexandria begged the saint to forgive them and their predecessors.

On this day, we also commemorate the Martyrs Onesiphoros and Porphyrios of Ephesus; Venerable Matrona of Constantinople; righteous mother Theoktista of Lesvos; Venerable Simeon the Translator; and Venerable Euthymios and Neophytos, founders of a monastery on Athos.

By their intercessions, O Christ God, have mercy upon us. Amen.
